I am in receipt of the following reports from the Eastern

occupied by a number of polish men and ar-
rested three for gaming on Sunday. A pack
of cards and 35 cents were secured as evi-
dence. The case was committed for the ac-
tion of the Grand Jury July 30, 1911.

Northeastern District...Sergt. Sutton and Patrolmen E.Myers, H.
Gernhardt and J.F.Vavrina entered saloon
of Annie Petran, 2034 E. Eager street, by
way of side gate and found the proprietor
and six men in the bar-room. Mrs. Petran
was arrested on the charge of selling liquor
on Sunday. Case dismissed.

zens clothing to look after conditions at Luna Park, Garrison
Lane & Baltimore street, reports he was there from 5 p.m., to
10:10 p.m., when the lights were turned off and everyone left
the park. There were about three or four hundred people there
walking back and forth, the racer dip and the carrousel were not
running; there was no band music, nothing doing except the peanut
and ice cream stand. Most of the people were minors.
