Violation of Sunday Liquor Law.

Report, as follows, was received, read and ordered filed, see Exhibit No. 3502:

To The Honorable,

The Board of Police Commissioners.

Gentlemen:-

I am in receipt of the following reports as to violations of the Sunday Liquor Law, namely:

EASTERN DISTRICT.....The saloon of J.G.Schwarzkopf, 1518 E. Pratt st., was raided 9:10 p.m., Sunday, August 6, 1911, by Rd.Sgt. Reifner, Sgt. Charles B.Potter and Officers J.Schaefer and William A. O'Brien. The proprietor and seven witnesses were arrested. Charge of selling liquor on Sunday was laid against the proprietor. The witnesses were held for the State. No evidence was secured. Committed for Court.

SOUTHWESTERN DISTRICT...Patrolman Geo. T. Sedicum, (plain clothes) Aug. 6th., 1911, (Sunday) raided the saloon of John J. Haake, 956 Frederick avenue, and captured 3 witnesses, secured evidence and arrested Haake on the charge of selling liquor on Sunday. Released on \$500. bail for Court by Justice Robert W. Beach.
