

T.Fred. Fitzberger, against Sergeant Edward C. Worden, Northern District, of using vile and indecent language towards the child of the said Fitzberger, as referred to in the proceedings of July 17th., 1911, the Board received the following report from the Marshal of his investigation of the facts in the case:

"Baltimore, Md., July 26, 1911.

To The Honorable,

The Board of Police Commissioners.

Gentlemen:-

In connection with the attached communication from James M. Chapman, Counsel for T. Fred. Fitzberger, complaining that Sergeant Edward C. Worden, N.D., used vile and indecent language to his child, beg to say I placed this matter in the hands of Detective Armstrong for investigation. The result of the investigation as contained in the report herewith is somewhat conflicting, and I would therefore, respectfully, recommend that Sergeant Worden be given the benefit of the doubt and that the matter be dropped.
