

Transfer.

Upon the application of the officer himself, approved by the Marshal, it was ordered that Patrolman Michael J. Hunt be transferred from the Southern to Southwestern District; said transfer to take effect Thursday, August 17, 1911.

Anti-Mosquito Ordinance.

It was ordered that the provisions of Ordinance No. 184, approved December 3, 1906, known as the Anti-Mosquito Ordinance, be re-published in the lookout sheet August 15th., and the captains instructed to see that the requirements of said ordinance are carried out by the members of the force.

Election Instructions.

As to the Primary Election to be held in Baltimore City, August 29th., 1911, it was ordered that the force be instructed to guide themselves by the printed instructions issued October 5, 1908, which relates to the duties of the police generally in connection with all elections.

The Board instructed that the attention of the force be called to the following existing order, viz:

"Members of the force must at all times abstain absolutely from electioneering and political discussions with citizens on the streets and elsewhere, and with each other; they are forbidden to take any part whatsoever, - beyond the exercise of their right to vote, - in the interest of any candidate or candidates for election and must so conduct themselves as to give no grounds for accusation of partian-ship."

And the Board instructed further:

"That every effort be made by the Marshal, superior officer and members of the Police Department to insure a quiet and orderly election and a fair count of the ballots cast; that the captains shall instruct each of the officers detailed for duty at the polling places to carefully note the actions of all officers of election, and if any violation of the election law takes place in the polling room, or irregularities occur in the count, he shall notify Police Headquarters by telephone at once.
