

porations, directly or indirectly, to sell, barter, give or dispose of any spiritous or fermented liquors, ale or beer, or intoxicating drinks of any kind on the day of any such Primary Election."

And it was ordered further that the Round Sergeants and Sergeants be directed to notify every saloon and hotel of the provisions of the above law, and in particular to the fact that hotels are not allowed to sell to guests, whether in their rooms or not, or to any one else.

And in connection with the coming Primary Election the Secretary was directed to have circular, as follows, printed and distributed to every dealer of intoxicating liquors in Baltimore City:

As to Selling or Furnishing Intoxicating
Liquors on Election Day.

In connection with the primary election to be held in Baltimore City on Tuesday, August 29th., 1911, the Board of Police Commissioners directs the attention of the keepers of all hotels, taverns, saloons, stores or any other establishments to the provisions of Section 682 and 685 of Article 4, Public Local Laws, (Charter), and to Chapter 741 of the Acts of the General Assembly of Maryland of 1910, which forbid the selling, bartering, giving or disposing of any spiritous or fermented liquors, ale or beer or intoxicating drinks of any kind on the day of any primary election in Baltimore City.

And attention is hereby called to the fact that election to be held as above referred to is a legalized primary election, and the provisions of the law in relation to the same will be strictly enforced.

Note:-- "Election Day" means from midnight of the previous day to midnight of the day on which election is held.
