Gentlemen:-

On August 16th., last an article appeared in the Baltimore Sun, stating that Patrolman Timothy Goonan, Southwestern District, had fallen heir to a large fortune and which afterwards proved to be merely a joke on the part of Patrolman Goonan himself and driver James Feeley, of the Southwestern District.

In view of this unauthenticated article, together with a photograph of Patrolman Goonan, appearing in the columns of the Sun, City Editor Will became somewhat displeased and I therefore caused an investigation to be made of the matter, the result of which is contained in the attached statements.

I called upon City Editor Will yesterday, (Sunday) and explained the matter to him and he informed me that he did not desire to have the officer responsible for the "fake story" (as he termed it), brought before your Honorable Board upon charges, yet he thought it would not be amiss if I summoned
