

the law against the sale of liquor in Baltimore City without a license, and to enable him to sell on Sunday in the pavilion at the outer end of the pier. It is an evasion that I do not think the courts will stand for, and I, therefore, advise that you take this matter up with the State's Attorney's office and have the indictment against Trenth for the sale of liquor in Baltimore City without license pressed to a speedy trial.

hold religious services, 924 Penna.ave.ue.

In the matter of the application of the Rev. R. J. Curtis, for permission to hold religious services at 924 Pennsylvania avenue, as referred to in the proceedings of August 24th, 1911, a report, as follows, was received, viz:-

Gentlemen:-

In returning herewith request of Rev. R. J. Curtis, 1553 Argyle avenue, for a permit to conduct religious services at 924 Pennsylvania avenue, I beg to invite your attention to report of Captain J. J. Santry upon the subject.

As Captain Santry advises that the 900 block Pennsylvania avenue is tenanted by both white and colored people, and he can see no reason why a permit should be refused. I would respectfully recommend that the Rev. R. J. Curtis be granted the privileges he seeks.
