I am in receipt of the following report from the Western District as to the raid on John Pasternokas' saloon, Sunday, 115 S. Paca street, namely:

"At about 10:50 p.m., September 3rd., 1911, Sergt. Alfred Moore and Patrolman John C. Rudel, in plain clothes, detailed to watch Sunday Liquor violations, gained an entrance to 115 S. Paca street, saloon of John Pasternokas, where they found one man drinking beer. They arrested John Pastarnokas on the charge of selling liquor on Sunday, Case dismissed by Justice Daniel L. Loden.
