Gentlemen:-

As per your letter of the 31st. ult. I herewith beg to submit samples of Police caps for your Department, and beg to quote you on an order of one hundred and sixty-eight (168) cloth caps, without rubber covers, for winter wear, as follows:

Blue cloth Police Cap, as sample No. 1.....\$1.87-1/2

Blue cloth Police cap, as sample No. 2..... 1.65

Blue cloth police cap, as sample No. 3..... 2.00

Blue cloth Police Cap, as sample No. 4..... 1.50

The sample, No. 1, is made of Oake's Metropolitan fine doe-skin 22 ounce, and waterproofed by the Cravenette process, and is identically the same cap that I made for you two years ago.

The sample No. 2, is the same shape cap exactly as No. 1 but made up of a cheaper quality cloth.

The sample No. 3, is the present regulation New York Department cap. It is made of the same materials as sample No.1. but with a furniture hair-cloth all around the upper part of the cap, so as to keep it in perfect shape and not allow it to break down at the sides or back, same as the caps now being worn by your Department.

All four of these caps are made up in the best possible manner, and I have quoted you the very best prices on these goods. I have gone very carefully into the cost of these caps and assure you that the prices quoted are the closest possible.
