A report, as follows, was received, read and ordered filed, see Exhibit No. 3563:

"Eastern District, September 19, 1911.

Thomas F. Farnan, Marshal of Police,

Sir:-

In reference to the matter of Matron Kate M. Hess accompanying a Mrs. Maggie Cook, who was a prisoner detailed at this station-house, to Mount Carmel Cemetery and to Light Street Wharf, I respectfully report on the same as follows:

On the 11th. inst. the body of an unknown white man was found in Federal Hill Park and sent to the morgue in the Southern District auto-patrol.

On the 13th. inst. the body was identified by Mrs. Cook as that of her husband, Conrad Cook.

The same day she was arrested by Officer George F. Bloome, on the charge of being drunk, she having been found by the officer in the neighborhood of Eastern avenue and Caroline street, commonly known as the "Hook".

When searched she was found to have \$139.00 At the afternoon sitting of the magistrate (Robert W. Beach), she was dismissed and left the station in company of Undertaker Robert Brooks, Calhoun and Hollins street.

The same night I received a telephone message from Mr. Brooks, that he and Mrs. Cook had been to the morgue and while on the way she had stopped to get two drinks. After leaving
