

tion on the part of any election official in the said polling place; that the business of the election throughout the day and the count of the ballots seemed to them to have been carried on in an orderly and proper way without any differences between the said officials, contentions or disputes, and so far as they knew or had any reason whatever to believe, the election in the said precinct had been conducted properly and fairly. (Exhibit 3577.)

In connection with this subject President Whelple excused himself from the meeting for the purpose of conferring with His Honor, Judge Henry Duffy, presiding in the Criminal Court, in respect to any action contemplated by the Court looking to the production of the ballot boxes of the 8th. Precinct of the 23rd. Ward, for the purposes of a judicial investigation.

After a few minutes President Whelple returned and reported to the Board that he had conferred with Judge Duffy and had been informed by the said judge that the Court intended to pass an order directing the Board of Police Commissioners to produce before the Grand Jury the ballot boxes used in said precinct in the primary election held in Baltimore City, August 29th., 1911; that Judge Duffy had shown him the order proposed to be passed, as referred to, and that the draft of said order had been so phrased as to protect the Police Department in the count of ballots by the Grand Jury.
