Patrick J. Tighe,  
Application for Reinstatement.

Communication, as follows, was received from Patrick J. Tighe, who was dismissed from the force on June 29, 1911:

To The Honorable Board of Police Commissioners,  
Court House, Baltimore, Md.

Gentlemen:-

I hereby respectfully make application to this Honorable Board for a reconsideration of my case with the hope that, owing to the circumstances of my case, you may see fit to grant me a reinstatement and a pension.

I was appointed to the Police Force of Baltimore City on May 11th., 1896, and have thus been serving as a Police Officer for over fifteen years. During my time of service I was three times injured while in discharge of my duty as an officer and I attach hereto a letter which I recently received from Dr. Geo. H. Steuart, now of Ottoman, Va., but formerly of this City who attended me at the University Hospital on one occasion when I received an injury while in the discharge of my duty. The records of the University Hospital have been destroyed by fire and this prevents me from obtaining any official record of the other occasions when I received treatment.

I respectfully refer this Honorable Board to the citizens who have confidence in me and believe me worthy of your consideration who have signed this application and recommend me for a pension.
