Dr. Davis called attention to entertainments at certain theatres on Sundays, and asked the Board's attitude in respect thereto. And to this the Board said that the Police Department would not interfere in such cases when in the exercise of its best judgment, the entertainments were of a sacred character and for a worthy object.

Reverend J. M. Gillen, for the Forest Park Improvement Association, stated that on Sunday before last a number of men and machinery were at work throughout the day on the new pavement being laid on Garrison avenue; that prior to last Sunday they had protested and requested the withholding of permission for last Sunday; that they first brought the matter to the attention of the Mayor who referred them elsewhere as having no knowledge in the premises; that then they called upon the Marshal who promised to inquire into the matter; that on Saturday evening the Marshal informed them that after investigation he had granted the contractor permission to work on the pavement as it was considered necessary; that while the Marshal was courteous in his talk, he refused to discuss the grounds for considering it necessary.

So Mr. Gillen said the delegation had come to the Board with a view of ascertaining who is responsible and where the authority lies.

To this the Board replied, in regard to last Sunday that the Department had acted upon representations made to it by the City Authorities - that the work was necessary in order that the pavement on Garrison avenue might be completed within a given time for purposes of taxation on property in that section; that failure to so complete said pavement would result in the loss of twenty to twenty-five thousand dollars to the city.

The Board stated further, in answer to Mr. Gillen that it was highly improbable that permission would be asked to work on Garrison avenue pavement on next Sunday, as the necessity for the same had apparently passed, but if application to so work should come to the department the matter will be carefully inquired into and decided as the circumstances seemed to require. The Association might rest assured, however, that no permission to work on Sunday on Garrison avenue would be granted on any trivial grounds.
