In respect to Patrolman Alexander H. Hobbs of the Northern District and Patrolman John E. Swift, Western District, now on the sick-list, a report, as follows, was received, read and ordered filed, see Exhibit No.

"Baltimore, October 23rd., 1911.

To The Honorable,

Board of Police Commissioners.

Gentlemen:-

Pursuant to instructions communicated to me on October 16th., through your Secretary, Mr. Kinsey, I took up the case of Patrolman Alexander H. Hobbs of the Northern District, with Dr. Williams, in whose medical district the officer resides.

I visited Mr. Hobbs at his residence on October 17th., and, on examination, found him suffering with an infected wound on his left leg, about midway between the knee and ankle, and located on the inner side of the shin-bone. The wound is about one and a half inches in width, two and a half inches in length, and one-eighth inch in depth. The limb was somewhat swollen from the knee to ankle, and the patient suffered acute pain when standing.
