To The Police Commissioners.

Dear Sirs:-

Owing to the active part politically taken by Mr. Joseph McLaughlin, an officer of the law, we hereby lodge a complaint against said officer for interfering in the election office of the 8th. Precinct of the 6th. Ward, while in the capacity of an officer of the law. Said complaint is registered on this wise:

First, That he deliberately took from the hand of the official registrator during the last registration, the transfer, claiming that it was his duty to hold same as evidence.

Secondly: That when said Joseph McLaughlin was informed as to his duty by the Judge of the Registration, he stated that it was his duty to see that the office was conducted fairly and also stated to the Judge that he thought he was a mutton-head, and in furtherance to that he would often take the liberty of opening the books, and in case of a dispute between the Judges as to the merit of a register or a ballot, he had the presumption of entering into the dispute.

We as the Judges in said office do most respectfully ask of you to give this your earnest consideration and in the spirit of fairness we ask you to remove said officer from the office.
