

OFFICE OF THEBOARD OF POLICE COMMISSIONERS.Court - House.Baltimore, Md., Monday, November 27th., 1911.Board met; present, Messrs. Whelple, Clotworthy & Tome.

The minutes of the previous meeting, Thursday, November 23, 1911,
were read, approved and adopted.

Trials.

Patrolman Michael J. Gaule, Central District, was tried upon
charge, as follows, preferred upon the complaint of E.R.Coggins,
Sr., 2829 Greenmount avenue:

Charge:CONDUCT UNBECOMING AN OFFICER:

In that he on Saturday, November 11th., 1911,
arrested Lyman McGreevey, Hanover street near Fayette,
upon insufficient ground; that on the way to
the Central District Station-house he promised "To
fix everything alright, and that if a fine were
imposed upon McGreevey, he, Patrolman Gaule, would
pay it"; because of which promise McGreevey's wit-
nesses were not produced at the time of the hearing
of the case before the Magistrate about 3 p.m., same
date."

Patrolman Gaule was acquitted of the foregoing charge, but
as it appeared from the testimony of the arrest and subsequent de-
velopments grew out of undue familiarity between Patrolman Gaule
and Lyman McGreevey and others, the Board directed that Captain
Henry be instructed to reprimand Patrolman Gaule on account of said
undue familiarity and to warn him if it continues he will be pre-
sented to the Board upon charges.

Patrolman Marion D. Caulk, Northern District, reported for hav-
ing been twenty-five minutes late for roll-call, 3:45 a.m., November
26, 1911, was excused.

Probationer Michael Kenney, Central District, was tried upon
and found guilty of the following charge:

"Being in the Engine room of the Merchants
and Miners Transportation Co., 112-114 S. Gay
street, from 11:15 to 11:45 p.m., on other than
police business."

It appeared from the testimony adduced that Probationer Kenney
showed signs of drink when he reported for duty at 7 p.m., November
