

the officers of the department arrived he ran away and about midnight of the same night gave himself up.

The Board considered that Probationer McNeal in exhibiting his pistol displayed lack of judgment and in running away from the scene showed poor policemenmanship, but in view of the fact that Probationer McNeal has been on the force but a few months, the Board decided to mitigate the punishment and imposed a fine of \$25.

In the matter of Patrolman James H. Stevens, Southwestern District, who was tried November 6th., 1911, charged with having failed to send in his report calls at 1;26 and 2;26 a.m., November 5, 1911.

As it appeared from the testimony in the hearing of the above charges that the officer was not only guilty of the charge, but had been guilty of lack of frankness in his statements to his superior officers and the Board. He was therefore fined \$25. and ordered deprived of five days' leave of absence.
