Sunday Concert.

A report, as follows, was received:

"Central District, December 4th., 1911.

Sir:-

Sergeant Harry Knight attended the performance at the Victoria Theatre, given by the Pioneer Social Club, and supposed to be sacred, and reports that with the exception of the address made by the Rev. Dr. Wm. Roseman and the singing of Miss Florence Millman, there was nothing sacred about the show. The following songs were sung:

"The girl like ⁷lady had"; that mysterious rag"; They were sung by the Bermans, the older not more than 12 years. There were other songs sung of the same character by the different singers. The song that was sung by the Newsboys quartet, I consider a disgrace. - This is the way they sang it; "George Washington was a good man, a lie he never told, but when he got that hatchet he gave that cherrytree ---- There were four or five verses and each one ended with the same meaning.

When the show was over, the orchestra played the "mysterious rag" and everybody sang. They also announced the Lady's Relief Association would be here next Sunday.
