That it is unlawful:-

To sell, or offer for sale, any cracker, squibs, rockets or other combustible fireworks. Penalty, fine not exceeding \$25. for each offense. (Ordinance No. 239, approved, December 28th., 190⁸).

Or to sell or give away what is known as the cartridge toy pistol. Penalty, fine \$50. to \$200. (Art. 27. Public General Laws, Section 398.)

Or for any person, to cast, throw or fire any squib, rocket, cracker, torpedo, grenade or other combustible fireworks or explosive preparations. Penalty, fine \$1. to \$5. (Art. 11, Baltimore City Code, 1906. Section 57. The provisions of this ordinance apply to private premises and enclosures, as well as to the public streets.

The police will take special and vigorous means to enforce these laws.
