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is sufficient room for these automobiles to stand in front of Union Station, and I would therefore recommend that Mr. Brunner's request in this instance be granted.

As to the placing of two automobiles on Eutaw street near Fayette street, it will be noted from Captain Morheiser's report that there are already several automobiles standing on Eutaw street, between Baltimore and Fayette streets, and that they have the consent of the proprietors in front of whose property they are standing. Should Mr. Brunner desire to place his automobile along the line with others they would encroach on the site of the Western National Bank, or Eutaw Savings Bank, both of whom object to the street in front of their institutions being occupied as automobile stands. Of course, if Mr. Brunner obtains the consent of the Bank officials, I would recommend also that his request in this case be granted.
