

toxicating liquors as if he had a hotel liquor license; in other words that he may sell between 12 o'clock midnight and 5 a.m., every day in the week, except Sunday, and on Sunday under the restrictions provided for the holders of hotel licenses.

The request was denied.

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Trial.

Patrolman Raleigh J. Feidt, Southern District, was tried upon and acquitted of the following charge, preferred by the Marshal on the complaint of Mrs. Margaret D. Austin:-

CONDUCT UNBECOMING AN OFFICER:

"In that he, sometime in the month of June, 1912, exact date not given - between the hours of 7 and 8 p.m., used towards Mrs. Margaret D. Austin, in the neighborhood of 1535 Covington street, insulting language and invited the said Mrs. Austin into the alley to fight."

In giving it's finding the Board took occasion to say to Patrolman Feidt, in the presence of the witnesses on both sides, that while it acquitted him of the charge, as lodged against him by Mrs. Austin, it did not desire to be understood as approving the conduct of the officer; that while he may have had great provocation on the occasion referred to in the charge, such as might have moved the ordinary citizen to intemperate talk, a patrolman should consider himself a little better than the average man in this respect and restrain his tongue and avoid neighborhood quarrels such as this case seems to have grown out of. And in that Patrolman Feidt in leaving his important duty in the strike territory even with permission to go to the Station-house to apply for a warrant for the arrest of Mrs. Austin, to get even with her, acted in a manner which reflected no credit on him and for which he should be reprimanded.
