I respectfully submit that a citizen is entitled to reasonable aid and assistance in detecting a criminal and in recovering property which has been stolen from him and I respectfully ask that you will direct the Detective Department, even at this late date, to make every reasonable effort to apprehend the criminal and recover the stolen goods.
