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Officer Cooney said, "Hit the black S.B." Officer Otto hit me over the head with his black-jack. Officer Cooney said again, "Are you going to open the door", and I said, "No I am not going to open it". He said "Hit the black S.B. the second time." When he said that Officer Otto hit me again over the head with the black-jack. After he hit me the second time I was dazed. They wrestled with me trying to pull me to the door. I cried to them to lock me up but not to beat me to death. They pulled me on the next pavement to a little alley which separates houses Nos. 1106 and 1104 East Lexington street. At that time Officer Cain asked me again to open the door and I said, "No". Officer Cain then hit me in the jaw with his fist and Officer Cooney struck me with his black-jack, then they arrested me. They charged me with assaulting, striking and kicking Officers Korn and Otto. The case was tried at the Central Police Station, and I produced proof that I did not raise a hand, and the Squire dismissed the case. I did not make any resistance; I was sick at that time, under a doctor's Care."

In connection with the complaint, as above, the Secretary reported further that he had, by direction of the Board, requested Mr. Bonsal to come to see the Board to day.

In as much as Mr. Bonsal failed to appear before the Board, and as this matter had been investigated by it in the hearing of the charges against Sergeant George J. Hoyle and Patrolman William Neslein, July 10th., 1912, the Board concluded to take no further action in respect to the complaint of Edward Myers. (See Exhibit No. 4013.)
