Dear Sir:-

Replying to your favor of the 10th. instant, I beg to say that I am unable to furnish you with the name of the officer and after this lapse of time I am sure I cannot identify him. The recollection of this occurrence has been dimmed in my memory by the other stirring occurrences of the Convention which subsequently took place, and I am sure that my testimony would be of no service, either in ascertaining the identity of the man, or the exact night of the occurrence. I am somewhat hazy as to whether it was the 26th. or 27th. I did not see the actual money pass, but it took place at Entrance "L" at about twenty minutes past eight o'clock, and the circumstances which fell under my observation and the remarks of the officer to me afterwards have brought conviction to my mind that all who entered through the entrance were not admitted solely on the presentation of tickets and without consideration.

Now that the Convention is over and the result has brought general satisfaction through the country, the minor incidents of dereliction of the officers to the Convention, I do not think, should be gone into so far as outsiders are concerned, and I hope that you will treat the information furnished above in such a manner as not to bring me into publicity or the necessity of declining to be a witness.
