

but there is a question of jurisdiction and as to how far the City Police can go in the matter.

This matter has been taken up with previous Boards of Police and we are no further advanced as to what we can do in the matter than at the beginning.

Shortly after I was placed in command of this District the matter was taken up and we got after the place and at that time the pavilion was connected with the shore by a bridge and I was informed that Mr. Kehl's attorney advised him to remove the bridge so that he would not be connected with the City of Baltimore, and he at that time removed the bridge and used boats to carry the people to the pavilion.

Later Mr. Kahl got a permit from the Harbor Board to build a bridge on the other side of the pavilion to connect with Long Bridge claiming that that part of the Long Bridge was in Baltimore County and when I saw what he was doing I went to Mr. Lackey and explained to him why Mr. Kahl was erecting the bridge, that it was for the purpose of violating the Sunday Liquor Law, Mr. Lackey took the matter up with the Harbor Board and they revoked the permit.

Mr. Kahl then constructed a float from the pavilion to within a few feet of the shore and any one can step from the shore to the float and get to the pavilion

Acting on instructions from a former Board of Police Commissioners an officer was placed at the pavilion on Sundays to take the names of the people visiting the place and these names were sent to the Baltimore City and Baltimore County Grand Juries for their action, and after they had been sent in on various Sundays for about 5 or 6 Sundays it was stopped to see what action the Grand Juries would take in the matter.

The license held at the pavilion was a Baltimore County license in the name of Ernest H. Trenth, 13th. District, Baltimore County.

I understand that there has not been any final disposition of the Baltimore County cases, but the City cases were disposed of as follows:

August 14, 11, Selling Liquor on Sunday. Dismissed by Grand Jury, August 15, 11.

August 7, 11, Selling Liquor on Sunday. Dismissed by Grand Jury. Reconsidered and ignored Sept. 7, 11.
