

said the former bartender had a good reputation and they appeared to have implicit faith in his honesty. No one could advise where the colored man, whose name I think is Dorsey, could be located. I could obtain no evidence indicative of the guilt of either the white or colored man.

On April 19th., at the instigation of Captain McGovern, the description of the property was again published on our daily Lookout Sheets.

On or about April 12th., 1912, we received a report that a boy, whose home is at Forrest Park, had disappeared and was last seen in the vicinity of Loyola College. I consulted the Priest in charge thereof and he summoned the boy, who seemed to tally with the description furnished by the employees of the University Club. The next day, however, one of the colored men who had seen the boy at the Club advised that the one at Loyola College was not the same. I assure you that everything consistent has been done by Captain McGovern and myself to come up with Mr. Shriver's property, but our efforts have thus far been unsuccessful.
