

Kahl's Saloon, - Off Ferry Bar.

In the matter of the sale of liquor in violation of law at the pavilion off-shore at Ferry Bar, known as Kahl's place, as referred to in the proceedings of July 12th., and 16th., 1912.

Mr. Roland B. Marchant, Deputy State's Attorney, called upon the Board at its request in the absence of the States Attorney. The report of Captain Charles M. Cole, dated July 14, 1912, was read to Mr. Marchant, and he was asked if the States Attorney's office would look into the matter of jurisdiction of the Police Department of Baltimore City in the premises and give the Board an opinion thereupon. This, Mr. Marchant, promised to do promptly, and the Secretary was directed to place in his hands for his information, all the papers in the matter, together with the opinions submitted to the Board December 10, 1907 and August 30, 1911, by Mr. Alonzo L. Miles, then counsel of the Board, on the subject.

Hamburg Street Grade Crossing.
Disorderly Conduct on.

Mrs. Farber stated to the Board that dogs received in the Animal Refuge do not remain there, but are disposed of usually within a short time after they are taken in; that for this reason and inasmuch as the licenses are not transferable, licenses for
