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Kahl's Saloon, - Off Ferry Bar.

In the matter of the sale of liquor in violation of law at the pavilion off shore at Ferry Bar, known as "Kahl's Place", as referred to in the proceedings of July 12th., 16th., and 17th., 1912, letter, as follows, was received and the matter held over: (Exhibit 4022-1/2). "Baltimore, July 18th., 1912.

To The Board of Police Commissioners of Baltimore City.

Courthouse, Baltimore.

Gentlemen:-

In response to your inquiry made of me yesterday concerning the sale of liquor at a certain pavilion at Ferry Bar near the Long Bridge, I beg to submit the following:

My understanding of the facts in this case is as follows: There is a certain saloon at Ferry Bar run by one Kahl, which saloon is situated in Baltimore City on the shore of the Patapsco River, between the Long Bridge and the property of the Maryland Motor Boat Club. On this property Kahl has a pavilion and conducts a bar room under a license issued to him by the Board of Liquor License Commissioners of Baltimore City. Directly in front of this property of Kahl's, and about fifty feet from the shore, built upon piles, there is a pavilion. This pavilion is connected with the shore by a float or raft, which float or raft is held in place by piles on either side. The raft is attached to and a part of the pavilion on one end, and on the shore it abuts the property of Kahl, although it does not seem to be attached to it.

Ernest Trenth holds a license issued by the Circuit Court of Baltimore County for the sale of liquor upon this pavilion. Under this license it seems that he sells liquor openly on Sunday.
