Our Mr. Rosenfeld has just returned from New York, where he had an understanding with the makers, that if he placed the order for this serge before twelve o'clock, Saturday, July twentieth, they would accept and deliver the goods at the old price, but Monday morning, July twenty-second, the new price will prevail by all the mills all over the United States, as that is the time set for all mills to set their new prices for the Spring 1913.

The wool that has gone into this serge, has always been of Australian type, imported wool, and it was guaranteed by the makers that this wool was dyed and cravenetted on the other side of the ocean, before they put it into yardage, therefore assuring us that it was properly rain proofed, which is not so well done in this country.

The question is, shall we order our goods for your patrolmen this week, and the price remains the same for 1913 as it was in 1912?
