Uniform Cloth.
As to Advance in Price of.

In respect to the letter from the New York Clothing House, (Rosenfeld Brothers), Contractors, for the furnishing of police uniform garments for the year ending December 31, 1912, as to the advance in price of serge used for police Summer uniforms, as referred to in the proceedings of July 18, 1912, the Secretary reported that he had sought information on the subject of the following named on the afternoon of July 18th.

Schloss Brothers & Co., wholesale clothiers, Paca & Baltimore streets, who stated that the price of serge for 1913 delivery would undoubtedly advance 15 to 25 cents per yard; although they could not assign the reason therefor.

M.Katz & Son, retail clothiers, 211-13 East Baltimore street, who stated that their advices were that the price of serge would go up from 7 cents a yard on. They could not assign the reasons for the advance, but thought that the Textile Strike had something to do with it.

E.H.Van Ingen & Co., dealers in woolens, 701 Union Trust Building, from whom no definite information could be obtained, but who promised to get it by telegraph from New York, but from whom no reply had been received.

In view of the statements in the letter from the New York Clothing House, and the report of the Secretary, as above, the Board consented to the New York Clothing House ordering the serge at this time to save the advance in the price thereof and the consequent increase in the cost of police summer uniforms for 1913.
