

Sale of Liquor Without License.
Steamer Starlight.

In the matter of the sale of liquor without license on the Steamer Starlight, complained of, as referred to in the proceedings of July 13, 1912, a report, as follows, was received, read and held over:-

To The Honorable,

The Board of Police Commissioners.

Gentlemen:-

In connection with the attached letter, signed 'Saloon keeper', and forwarded to your Honorable Body by the Board of Liquor License Commissioners, in respect to sale of liquors, without a State License, aboard the Steamer Starlight, after she leaves her wharf, foot of Caroline street, and while within the limits of the city, beg to say, I engaged the services of Private Detective James B. Williams, (colored), and he reports as follows (see reports attached).

From these reports it would appear that the law was not violated within the city limits on these two occasions.

If it is the desire of your Honorable Body I will again have Williams make a trip, or trips on the Starlight. Williams' charges are \$5.00 per diem.
