

Charles H. Barber, Hotel Calvert, #347 N. Calvert street. About 9:10 p.m., Sunday, July 21st., 1912, Patrolmen Korn and Charles H. Finch, visited this place. Finch registered, but Korn did not; while seated at the table in this place these officers observed that beer and whiskey were furnished to persons other than bona-fide guests; the bar-keeper and eleven witnesses were placed under arrest; they secured as evidence one bottle of beer, one glass of beer and the hotel register.

Fountain Hotel, #122 E. Pratt street. This place was visited by Sergeant Burns, Patrolmen Cain and Klingenberg about 7:40 p.m., Sunday, July 21st., 1912: They observed that six persons were furnished with intoxicating liquors without purchasing anything to eat. Mr. Riley the proprietor, and six witnesses were placed under arrest, one of the latter being a minor.

Frank Tierney, Academy Hotel, 300 W. Franklin street; about 10:20 p.m., Sunday, July 21st., 1912, was visited by Sergeant Gatch and Patrolman Otto, where they observed that intoxicating liquors were being served to others than bona-fide guests. Tierney was arrested charged with violating the Sunday liquor law; Peter Herndon, colored, a Waiter, was also arrested charged with working on Sunday; evidence obtained two glasses with portions of beer in each, also two witnesses.

At the following named places nothing of an intoxicating nature could be procured unless one properly registers and orders something to eat, viz:

Desch's Hotel, 1429 N. Charles st. - Sergt. Burns, Patrolmen Cain and Klingenberg.

Flack's Hotel, 1300 N. Fulton ave., - Sergt. Roche and Patrolman Bavis.

Forbes' Hotel, 301 McMechen st. - Patrolmen Murphy and Panuska.

Raleigh Hotel, Holliday and Fayette sts. - Sergt. Plantholt and Patrolman Collins.

Hotel Theodore (Robert E. Nunnally, ) 702-04 E. Baltimore street, - Sergt. Carroll, Patrolmen Doherty and Webster, and Miss Harvey.
