The petition of the Board of Police Commissioners of Baltimore City respectfully represents:

1. - That during the period of time covered by the circumstances hereinafter set out, Frederick Dorsch was the licensee of the State of Maryland to sell, offer for sale and keep for sale intoxicating liquors by retail by the drink upon the premises at 1800 East Chase street in Baltimore City, and did not during such period hold a hotel license.
2. - That said Frederick Dorsch being such licensee, as aforesaid, did violate certain laws of the State relating to the sales of intoxicating liquor in manner following, that is to say:
 - (a) - That the said Frederick Dorsch on the 7th. day of April, in the year 1912, the same day in the said year being the Lord's day, in and about the said premises unlawfully did sell and furnish intoxicating liquors to some or all of the following named, to wit:

William Stenger,
William S. Stinson,
William Woolen,
Murray Westcott,
George Stergon.
 - (b). - That the said Frederick Dorsch on the 8th. day of May, in the year 1912, plead guilty, in the Criminal Court of Baltimore City to the charge of selling and furnishing intoxicating liquors as aforesaid, and was sentenced to pay a fine of Fifty Dollars and costs therefor, by His Honor, Judge James P. Gorter, sitting in the said Court.
 - (c). - That the said Frederick Dorsch on Saturday the 13th. day of July, in the year 1912, in and about the said premises, unlawfully
