James Campbell, - a minor, eighteen years of age,

Arthur F. Padgett,

Martin Carroll,

Allen G. Williamson.

(e). - That the said Frederick Dorsch on the said 14th. day of July, in the year 1912, did sell and furnish intoxicating liquor in and about the said premises to which he allowed an entrance other than directly from a public traveled way.

Wherefore your petitioner prays this Honorable Board:

(a) To give notice to the said Frederick Dorsch of the charges preferred in this petition and require him to show cause why his license should not be revoked.

(b). To revoke the license of said Frederick Dorsch.
