

In brief the facts are that Patrolman Boyd noticed a colored man near the corner of Fremont and Pratt streets whom he thought answered the description of a colored man wanted in the Southwestern District on the charge of shooting a man: when Patrolman Boyd accosted this colored man, who afterwards proved to be Joseph Williams, he ran away and Patrolman Boyd pursued him, at the same time rapping on the pavement with his night stick: Sergeant Glenn took up the chase, firing off his revolver, then Patrolman Ludwig entered the pursuit and also fired off his revolver: when the third shot was fired by Patrolman Ludwig he stumbled and the ball going low struck Williams in the leg.

In my judgment the use of revolvers by Sergeant Glenn and Patrolman Ludwig was entirely uncalled for, especially by Sergeant Glenn, as it may have terminated in the wounding or killing of some innocent person.

I would therefore, respectfully, recommend that both Sergeant Glenn and Patrolman Ludwig be cited before your Honorable Body upon charges.
