

said, did violate certain laws of the State relating to the sale and furnishing of intoxicating liquor in the manner following, that is to say,

(a).- That the said J.Frank Kelly on the 30th. day of May, in the year 1909, on or about such premises, 827 Raborg street, unlawfully did sell and furnish intoxicating liquor to some or all of the following named, to wit: Perry L.J.Dorsey, Walter West, Alice Travers, Charles Bailey, George Dent, George Brown, George Albert, Smith Galley and Arthur McComas,

(b).- That the said J. Frank Kelly on the 6th. day of January, in the year 1910, was convicted of the said charge of selling and furnishing intoxicating liquor as aforesaid, in the Criminal Court of Baltimore City, and sentenced to pay a fine of Fifty Dollars and costs.

(c).- That during the time the said J.Frank Kelly was the holder of a license to sell, offer for sale and keep for sale intoxicating liquors upon the said premises, 827 Raborg street, issued to him in the year 1909, as aforesaid, the police had good reason to believe, and did believe that the said J.Frank Kelly unlawfully did on divers occasions sell and furnish intoxicating liquors on Sunday, the Lord's day, and during such hours on other days, during which it was then and is now unlawful for a saloon licensee to sell and furnish intoxicating liquors, although, - despite the efforts of the police to apprehend him therefor, - he succeeded by a system of watchers and stealthful practices, in escaping arrest for such violation of law until the 30th day of May, in the said year, 1909, as aforesaid.

Wherefore your petitioner prays this Honorable Board,

(a).- To revoke the said permit granted the said J.Frank Kelly:

(b).- To deny the application of the said J.Frank Kelly for a license.
