Gentlemen:-

In connection with the attached newspaper clipping, relative to Patrolman Charles T. Stallings, Southwestern District, being financially interested in the employment of a cart by the City Street Cleaning Department.

I instituted an investigation and obtained statements from Patrolman Charles T. Stallings, Louis Vogel, Mrs. Maggie Vogel and William A. Larkins, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, which are submitted herewith.

After going over these statement I cannot see wherein Patrolman Stallings is in any manner violating the rules of the department and would therefore respectfully recommend
