Smoking allowed in Moving
Picture Parlor.

In the matter of smoking being permitted in Lubin's Moving Picture Parlor, Baltimore street near Holliday, complained of as dangerous by Mr. Max Carton of the Jewish Educational Alliance, by telephone, the Deputy Marshal submitted report, as follows, from Captain George G. Henry, Central District:
