Complaint of Eugene J. Cronin.

vs.

Patrolman Michael J. Noonan.

Report, as follows, submitted by the Deputy Marshal, was received:-

"Baltimore, Md., August 2nd., 1912.

To The Honorable,

The Board of Police Commissioners.

Gentlemen:-

In returning herewith, communication from Eugene J. Cronin, together with a newspaper clipping in respect to an alleged assault by Patrolman Michael J. Noonan upon Catlette Pullian, while the latter was under arrest, I beg, respectfully, to state that I referred this matter to Captain H.P. Morheiser, Western District, for a thorough investigation, the result of which is contained in the various statements hereto attached.

After going over these statements carefully I have reached the conclusion that Patrolman Noonan was perfectly justified in his actions towards the prisoner, notwithstanding the opposite stand taken by Mr. Cronin.

I would therefore recommend that the complaint against Patrolman Noonan be filed without further action.
