In the matter of Patrolman William J. Crowe, Northern District, reported upon by the Police Physicians as having been examined by them and found permanently incapable of performing active police duty, as referred to in the proceedings of August 7, 1912, the Secretary reported that he had talked with Patrolman Crowe: that the said patrolman stated he had consulted eye specialists and been advised by them that no operation could be undertaken until the cataract reached a certain stage of development and when that stage of development would arrive could not be told; that the said patrolman felt himself unable to discharge the duties of his office, and that under all the circumstances retirement on pay would be acceptable to him.

In view of the report of the physicians, as above referred to, and the further statement by them that although the operation upon the eyes of Patrolman Crowe might be successful, he would be unable to see without glasses; and in view further of the attitude of Patrolman Crowe, as reported by the Secretary,

It was ordered that Patrolman William J. Crowe be retired on one-half pay; said retirement to date from August 15, 1912.

The vote upon the retirement of Patrolman William J. Crowe, on one-half pay, as above, was:
