The Board of Police Commissioners.

Gentlemen:-

Referring to the attached application of Henry Bletzer, American Athletic Association, for a permit to hold a boxing contest at Albaugh's Theatre, August 9th., 1912.

I referred this matter to Captain George G. Henry, Central District, for his views, and he reports that in his judgment contests of this kind should not be permitted at Albaugh's Theatre for the reason that this theatre is located in the midst of a first-class residential section and the holding of these affairs is naturally a source of annoyance to the residents.
