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And in reply to the inquiry of the Board of Liquor License Commissioners the Secretary was directed to transmit to that Board copy of the report made by Lieutenant Joshua J.W.Shockley, in charge of the Western Police District, as well as copy of the Marshal's report to the Board, as above.

And the Secretary was directed to state in transmitting these reports that as the law contemplates that licenses shall only be granted to persons of good character, the Board does not endorse the suggestion in these reports that a license be issued to Marx H. Springer on the condition that he will keep the windows of the place free from obstructions. This being a matter for the consideration of the Board of Liquor License Commissioners.

Saloon

John A. Vain, 1920 Fairmount avenue.

In respect to the communication received from the Board of Liquor License Commissioners as to the saloon of John A. Vain, 1920 Fairmount avenue, as referred to in the proceedings of August 9, 1912, report, as follows, was submitted by the Marshal:-

"Baltimore, Md., August 12th., 1912.

To The Honorable,

The Board of Police Commissioners.

Gentlemen:-

In returning, herewith, communication from the Board of Liquor License Commissioners, in respect to alleged violations of law at the saloon of one John A. Vain, 1920 Fairmount avenue, beg to say that I referred this matter to Cap't Frank J. Zellers, Northeastern District, for attention, and he reports that there was no evidence of the law being violated yesterday(Sunday).

He reports, however, that about 11:15 a.m., August 10, 1912, Patrolman Henry A. Busky, who was detailed in citizens dress to watch Vain's place, observed Dorothy Moran, aged 7 years, go to the side door of Vain's place and pass a kettle in the door and when it was passed out again it contained a pint of beer. A warrant was issued for Vain and he was re-
