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There is at the present time at the Northwestern Police Station a horse and carriage for the use of the Captain of the Northwestern District solely, whereas the Captain of the Northeastern District is without such conveyance. As the Northeastern District covers a large area, and in order that the Captain of this district may visit the different sections of his district at various times during the week, I would respectfully recommend that the Northwestern District horse and carriage be used alternately between the Captain of the Northwestern and Northeastern District; the horse and carriage, however, to remain at the Northwestern District as the Northeastern District has not sufficient accommodations for an additional team.
