Prisoners Arrested for Counterfeiting.

On and after this date, when any person or persons are arrested charged with passing counterfeit money and brought to your station, you will immediately notify Captain Charles E. Wright, Agent of the United States Secret Service, of the arrest by telephone, advise him where the prisoners may be seen, and permit Captain Wright or his representatives to interview the persons under arrest.

It frequently occurs that persons charged with such crimes give fictitious names and addresses when arrested and are not known to the Police, but are known to the Secret Service officials, who can immediately investigate the case and secure evidence which, should there be any delay, would be destroyed by the accomplices of the prisoner. Captain Wright can be reached during the day by calling St. Paul 718, and at night by calling Wolfe 2244."
