Saloon Raids.

Report, as follows, was received, read and a copy of same ordered referred to the Board of Liquor License Commissioners:

The Board of Police Commissioners.

Gentlemen:-

The following is a report of raids made in the various districts yesterday (Sunday), namely:-

Andy Wisnewcki, 1928 Fleet street, selling liquor on Sunday and allowing entrance to saloon other than regular public traveledway; released on bail, in both cases, for the action of the Grand Jury.

Hattie Johnson (colored), who conducts a cook-shop, 1442 Block street, charged with selling and furnishing intoxicating liquor (whiskey) without a license; dismissed by Magistrate.

Hyman Beddick, 1216 E. Lexington street, charged with allowing gaming (card playing) on his premises, also five men arrested charged with gaming on Sunday; dismissed by Magistrate.

Nicholas C. Lenhoff, working in saloon of Henry Spahn, 1312 E. Eager st; fined \$5. and released. A warrant has been sworn out for Spahn charging him with selling and furnishing intoxicating liquor on Sunday, but as yet has not been served owing to his whereabouts being unknown.
