There are three saloons in the neighborhood, viz: 156 N. East ave., 101 N. Curley st. and 165 N. Streeper st. Each of these is two blocks distant. The property 165 N. Hare street is owned by Eugene Masseron"

Sergeant Gaffey reports: "John B. Davis, 2219 E. Fayette st., applicant for saloon license at 165 N. Hare st., kept a saloon at 135 W. Cross st. until about sixteen months ago. I know Mr. Davis, as I worked that section for about two years. He always conducted an orderly place, and as far as I know was never indicted for violaing the law. He is now unemployed and has been for sometime. The house 165 N. Hare street is situated less than 200 feet from the Christian Union Church, Rev. Frank Hurtt, Pastor, Philadelphia avenue near Ellwood avenue."

Damage to Awning
Complaint from Mary C. Hughes.
#30 N. Linwood ave.

In regard to the complaint from Mary C. Hughes, #30 North Linwood avenue, as to the damage to awning of premises #7 North Linwood avenue, as referred to in the proceedings of August 28th, 1912, a report, as follows, was received through the hands of the Marshal;

Sir:-

In reference to the enclosed letter addressed to Captain Frank J. Zellers, Northeastern District, in the matter of complaint made by a Mrs. Mary C. Hughes, #30 N. Linwood avenue, Officer Bernard P. Kelly of this district reports as follows:

About 11 p.m., on the night of July 23rd, 1912, while making the arrest of Frederick Nassner, Louis Wellslager, Louis Luckan and Michael Costella for burglarizing the grocery store of Scanlan and Son, #1 N. Linwood avenue, I had occasion to get on the roof of #9 N. Linwood avenue, the thieves having taken to the roof. In doing so I threw the trap-door off the roof. It fell on a stationery canvas awning supported by wooden braces which were about five feet long and three feet wide, damaging same about \$2.00. The awning was the property of Mrs. Mary Hughes who owns #7 N. Linwood avenue, but who resides at #30. N. Linwood avenue.

Will also state that a report of the trap door being accidentally thrown off the roof by Officer Kelly was made out and sent to your office at the time. Said report, for which
