"In my opinion the 400 block Federal street between Barclay street and Greenmount avenue, is a mixed block and colored people have the right to move into the said block."

The report of the Deputy Marshal, as above, was accepted, and the Secretary was directed to communicate with Mr. Geisendaffer, in accordance therewith.
