

Probationary Patrolman William L. Walsh, Central District, appointed in the force September 11th., 1911, having served one year, reported upon favorably by his captain and certified by the Police Physicians as physically qualified to continue to discharge the duties of a patrolman, was advanced from patrolman of the third to a patrolman of the second grade, as entitled to receive the salary of \$17.50 per week from and including September 12, 1912.

Liquor, - Sale of at Balls.

In respect to the ball held at 1523 Beason street, September 9, 1912, for which a permit to sell liquor was granted to licensee Max Hecker, as referred to in the proceedings of September 6, 1912, a report, as follows, was received, read and ordered filed, see Exhibit No. 4153:-

The Board of Police Commissioners.

Gentlemen:-

In accordance with instructions I detailed Mrs. Faber, Police Matron and Patrolman Cain (in citizens dress) to attend the ball held under the auspices of the German Hungarian Liederkranz, at 1523 Beason street, September 9th., 1912. Liquor and refreshments were sold and served under the license of Max Hecker, 1523 Beason street.

Miss Faber and Patrolman Cain failed to observe any improper dances and the affair was conducted in an orderly manner with the exception that during the evening a young girl of fourteen years of age ordered and was served with a glass of beer; the girl's name and address was obtained; the beer taken to the Southern District Station-house and a warrant sworn out for Hecker charging him with selling intoxicating liquor to a minor.
