CHAPTER 23. AN Additional Supplement to an Act entitled an Act to regulate sales by Public Auction, passed at December session, eighteen hundred and twenty seven, chapter one hundred and eleven.

Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Maryland, that from and after the first day of April next, all stocks of Banks, or other incorporated Institutions, State or civil loans, goods, or property under an order of decree of any Court, sold at public auction by any person or persons, who shall take out a license to sell by auction in the manner prescribed in the act, to which this is a Supplement, shall be subjected to a duty of one half of one per centum of the amount for which the same shall be sold, to be paid by the person, who shall sell the same, and accounted for, and paid into the State Treasury by the auctioneer making such sale, in the manner, and at the time now required by law.

**LAW OF MARYLAND.**

CHAPTER 25. AN Act to facilitate the collection of State Taxes in Saint Mary's county.

WHEREAS it has been represented to the General Assembly that the Collectors of the Taxes, levied for the use of this State, in St. Mary's county, were appointed in the months of August and September, in each year, and that, whereas, doubts are entertained in reference to the validity of the aforesaid appointments, the responsibility of the Bonds given by the said collectors, and their power to enforce the collection of the said Taxes. For remedy whereof, and to remove such doubts—Therefore, the General Assembly doth enact, That the appointment by the county authorities of Saint Mary's county of the several collectors of the Taxes levied for the use of this State in said county, and the same is hereby confirmed and made valid; and the said collectors are hereby declared to be clothed with all the powers, rights and privileges of the collectors who may have been appointed in strict conformity with the said Act of Assembly, or any other existing Law, upon the subject; and the Bonds of the said collectors, and the appointments made in strict conformity with the Law.

SECT. 2. And be it enacted, that before this Act shall have effect, the said collectors shall file with the Levy Clerks, or Commissioners of the tax of said county, their assent, in writing, to the provisions thereof.
