COLLECTOR'S NOTICE.

I hereby notify all whom it may concern, that after the first day of January 1844, interest will be charged upon all accounts of county charge, direct tax, or officer's fees due for the year 1843. Persons having money by them would save the interest by promptly paying their accounts. I have heretofore urged upon the people the propriety and even necessity of an early settlement of their taxes. Upon this subject I have no discretion. The law has prescribed the days that I must settle with the Treasurer of Maryland, and if I fail to comply with the terms of the law, my bond may be put in suit. I regret very much that I have been disappointed in the effects of the different appeals I have made to the people upon this subject, and hope that they will no longer delay in calling promptly upon me, & settling their taxes. Such a course would afford me great satisfaction, and prevent a deal of trouble both to themselves & to me. Fear it always in mind that the taxes must be paid, and that if they are not paid voluntarily, the strong arm of the law will have to coerce payment.
